Historical archaeologists have long worked in and on the ruins of capitalism, settler-colonialism, and modernity in general. Today, the archaeological discipline finds itself considering its identity and purpose in a world met by challenges stemming directly from these forces and their respective histories. The social challenges that now characterize our world, rooted in long-standing issues of inequality, demand a response perhaps best captured in three concepts—Reparations, Reconciliation, and Restitution. Yet, these concepts are in no way straight-forward or easy to implement. To begin addressing these challenges, this panel brings together a cross-section of the field of historical archaeology. Participants will discuss how the discipline of archaeology might develop new questions that address concerns ranging from police violence to environmental colonialism.
